Although the authorship of this poem is still debatable, it is commonly attributed to **Mother Teressa** because the virtues it extols are aligned with her personal character and unselfish service.

Do It Anyway!

"People are unreasonable, illogical, and self-centered. – Love them anyway!

If you do good, people will accuse you of selfish and ulterior motives. -

Do good anyway!

If you are successful you will win false friends and true enemies. - **Succeed anyway!**

The good you do today will be forgotten tomorrow. -

Do good anyway!

Honesty and frankness make you vulnerable. - **Be honest** and frank anyway!

The greatest people with the noblest ideas can be shot down by the smallest people with the smallest minds. -

Think big anyway!

People favor underdogs but follow only top dogs. - **Fight for** an underdog anyway!

What you spend years building may be destroyed overnight. -

Build anyway!

People that really need help often attack you if you help them -

Help people anyway!

Give the world the best you've got, and you'll get kicked in the teeth. -

Give your best anyway!"



The following is an analysis of the main points that the poem emphasizes.

Unconditional Kindness

The poem repeatedly encour-

ages acts of kindness, forgiveness, and honesty, even when people might be unreasonable, ungrateful, or deceitful.

Inner Motivation

The poem emphasizes that the motivation for good deeds should come from within us, not from external validation.

Acceptance of Challenges

It acknowledges that doing good might lead to criticism, rejection, or even betrayal, but encourages us to persevere despite these obstacles.

Focus on Conscience

In the final analysis, what you decide to do is between you and God. This thought reinforces the idea that the true value of your actions lies in your own conscience and not in the opinions of others.

If we all resolve to live by the sublime ideas that are expressed in this poem, we will definitely exert a positive influence on the people in our communities, and our church will stand out as a paragon of goodness and integrity. Resolve to glorify the Lord Jesus by your upright living and righteous deeds throughout the New Year.

l. Door closures on main double doors were replaced.



Vartkes Ketenjian 1930 - 2024

Vartkes Ketenjian was born to Hagop and Beatrice Ketenjian in Beirut, Lebanon on March 6, 1930. He was the second of four siblings and was raised in a loving, Christian home. His older brother Edward, sister Sirvart and younger brother Boghos were taught to love God, love others, and appreciate their identity as Armenians.

Vartkes spend his childhood and early adulthood in Lebanon and came to the United States in 1956. He married Berjouhi Gurlekian in Chicago, Illinois on May 11, 1957. They were blessed with 3 children: Ruth, Hagop, and Samuel.

Vartkes and Berjouhi moved to California in 1962 and began attending Immanuel Armenian Congregational Church. They continued their membership their entire lives. Immanuel became the Ketenjians' second family. He attended church faithfully

and served in different ways through the years, most regularly, as weekly greeter. His last outing was to church on July 14, 2024.

Thanks to the church family who have encouraged and cared fo him. Special thanks to the ladies who blessed him weekly with delicious care packages to take home and enjoy since Berjouhi's passing.

Vartkes worked for ITT Grinnell for 25 years in the fire protection equipment sales. He was an avid walker and walked until age 90. He also enjoyed bike riding, going out to eat and spending time with his family. He was a man of few words but when he spoke, he had wisdom to share. He was quietly generous to those in need, both here and abroad. He loved his family, and many special memories were made over the years at his home in Granada Hills.

Vartkes is survived by his loving sister, Sirvart and brother, Boghos, his sons, Hagop (Cynthia) and Samuel (Lena), his grandchildren Heather (Chris), Timothy, Mark (Jennifer), Hannah (William), Rachel, Taline (James), and Andrew, and his great-grandchildren Samantha, Ryan and Kacie.

JoAnn Ohanesian 1951 - 2024

JoAnn was born on July 5, 1951 to Bob and Henrietta Ohanesian at the California Hospital in Los Angeles. She spent her early years in Fresno living on the family farm until they relocated to Arcadia in 1961. After she finished her formal education she began working at Pasadena City College Library in 1971 and remained there for 43 years until she retired. After retirement she enjoyed traveling extensively.

JoAnn used her gifts and talents to tirelessly serve the Lord and the Armenian community with great joy and generosity all her days! When she wasn't at work at PCC she was dedicated to family, friends, her church at Immanuel Armenian Congregational Church and the Massis Guild and other charitable organizations.

The Ohanesian Family gatherings and milestones were celebrated with Armenian food lovingly prepared by Jo-Anne's mother, Henrietta, and aunties and sisters. This is where JoAnn "apprenticed" and became an Armenian Master Chef and Master Pastry Chef. Those family recipes were handed down but not always written down and JoAnne worked hard recreating the special dishes from memory -"achke chop" - then wrote down the recipe. She was an oral historian and with her amazing memory she would tell dear stories of her family and the good old days. At home she cultivated a lovely flower garden of calla and day

lilies, irises and of course her lovely roses with intoxicating scents. She would bring them to church on special occasions or bring them to you on visits. She had fruit trees too and made wonderful batches of apricot preserves this past summer.

At Immanuel Armenian Congregational Church where she was a long time member, she served as Deaconess, Council member and was the Chair of Ladies Aid. She spearheaded and organized Bake Sales to raise funds for the AMAA's Child Sponsorship and Educational Program in Armenia and Lebanon. She baked a good portion of the baked goods for these bake sales and for special occasions, as our Anniversary Banquet and Mother's Day Luncheon. She faithfully attended the Immanuel Women's Spiritual Fellowship Bible study which met monthly to grow in God's Word. At our October Bible study JoAnn shared how she met a lady in the line at the grocery store who was going through chemo and JoAnn encouraged this lady and shared her own cancer experience with her and uplifted this stranger at this divine meeting.

She was also a member of Massis Guild which meets monthly to benefit the Armenian Ararat Home for the Aged and Infirmed in Mission Hills, Eagle Rock, Glendale area.

The main ingredient JoAnn used throughout her life was service in action! She lovingly, generously and joyfully served the Lord and was a blessing in each of our lives, and her loving legacy will live on in our hearts!

On November 13, 2024 JoAnn Ohanesian, beloved daughter, sister, aunt, and friend, was called home to the Lord at the age of 73 in Arcadia, California.

She is survived by her sister Jacquie, nephew Derek, and niece Kelly and Kelly's son, River, who was the joy of JoAnn's life! JoAnne was preceded in death by her parents, her sister Pat, and her brother Bob.

My first face to face encounter with JoAnn was at a funeral at Rose Hills in 2004.

I say face to face because I was living on the east coast while the rest of my family was still in California. I had been hearing stories from afar from my mother, Bernice Shamlian, about a very special and dear friend. By the time I actually met JoAnn I felt I already knew her.

The stories and experiences with my mother's dear friend she relayed to me were so hard to believe...how could one person be so selfless, caring, generous and kind to so many people? Impossible!! No, it was not impossible — it was a given fact. JoAnn was this true, lovely, generous friend not only to my mom but to so many that have most certainly been touched, somehow by her acts of kindness and her priceless love.

Months after meeting JoAnn, my husband, Rev. Jirair Sogomian and I returned to California and settled down to be near our family. Immanuel Church, at the time, was without a minister so he became interim pastor at the church and our own personal journey began with sweet JoAnn. She was a constant source of support to us and gave her all in every way. Her talents in the kitchen-and we all know what a great baker she was—her willingness to serve on boards and committees -you name it she did it. She loved her church and showed it in numerous

JoAnn lived her faith when she was diagnosed with breast cancer and with the help and support of her family, especially Pat, her sister who advocated for her as she navigated surgery, chemo and other therapies and countless appoint-

ments. JoAnn, slowly regained strength and became a survivor. It was a heartbreak for JoAnn when Pat was diagnosed with cancer in 2008 and JoAnn ministered and supported her until she went home to the Lord.

When health issues and death hit our family we were once again surprised by this amazing friend we were privileged to have. We would receive a call from her asking how things were going, how we were feeling and just about our day in general. Little did we know that in a few hours JoAnn would be at our door with a beautiful smile on her face and arms loaded with packages of food-enough for an entire week. She would come in, put everything away, share a few minutes with us and be on her way home mind you she had just driven over 50 miles to do her acts of kindness-but no matter how hard we tried to have her stay awhile and relax a bit before the long drive back—she would simply smile, say thank you and be on her way. This didn't just happen once but went on and on!! There was no end to her acts of kindness to all of us and so many others she touched while here on earth. Although JoAnn had serious health issues, she never worried about herself. Her only concerns were to reach out to her family and friends and help in any way possible. Family and friends were everything to her. Her love for all was endless.

I'm sure you have similar stories and have been touched by our dear JoAnn in a special way.

We will all miss her and never ever forget her or her beautiful spirit and love for all. Heaven's gates were opened wide as an angel came and took her by the hand to her place with our Lord. God bless her memory.

Travel with Jack was so very easy since he took care of organizing all the details. JoAnn and I would always room together and was a great roommate. We got along so well that half the time people would mix us up and call us the others' name. We didn't care because we were usually together so it didn't matter, we would answer to either name.

Jo Ann was a great shopper and so very generous. On our trips, she was always looking to bring back something for her family and friends as a remembrance of her travels.

My devotional said it best, she loved to bestow gifts to everyone, from the gardener, mail carrier, the neighbor, and house cleaner. She loved to give all year long and we all benefited from her generous heart.

Our dear Auntie "E.C." passed away quietly, pain and disease free in her own home with Marcy, Jesse, Jon, Jace, and J-Jay by her side, to send her into the arms of the Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.
