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PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Dear Church Members & Supportive Friends,

Every year, on April 24, the Armenians of the world, solemnly observe a tragic event, the anniversary of the First Genocide of the 20th century, that happened during World War I, and is continuing today, through the Azerbaijan-Turkey alliance that ethnically cleansed Artsakh, known as Nagorno Karabakh, of its indigenous Armenian population, who had lived there for 3,000 years.

About 2 million Armenians perished in Eastern Turkey (Western Armenia) between the years 1894 and 1923. After the humiliating defeat of the Turkish Ottoman armies in Greece and the Balkan countries of Eastern Europe by freedom-seeking Christians, the Turks vent their anger by massacring the Christian minorities in Asia Minor and Anatolia. The campaign to exterminate the Armenians began during the bloody reign of Sultan Abdul Hamis II, who was nicknamed "The Red Sultan" because he had slaughtered 300,000 Armenians. After the ruthless Sultan was deposed by the so-called Young Turks, who attempted to stop the continuous decline of the once mighty Ottoman Empire, they resumed the massacre of Armenians in 1908, when they killed 50,000 Armenians in the province of Adana, in the region of Cilicia.

When the First World War broke out in 1914, the Turks continued their policy of annihilating the Armenians on a large scale by taking advantage of the turmoil that the war had created. Talaat Pasha, the Turkish Minister of War and the leader of the Young Turk party, admitted his government's criminal intent, when he said, "Turkey is taking advantage of the war in order to thoroughly liquidate its internal foes."

Henry Morgenthau, the US ambassador to Turkey, writes in his Memoirs, "What the Turks were doing was a carefully planned scheme to exterminate the Armenian race."

Aurora Mardiganian, in her book titled, "Ravished Armenia" describes how she was raped and thrown into a Turkish harem where young Christian girls were kept to be used as concubines by high-ranking Turkish officials. Fortunately, she was able to escape and while fleeing from her tormentors, she saw 16 Christian girls who had been crucified, with nails driven through their hands and feet. Such horrible scenes were portrayed in the 1919 documentary film "Auction of Souls."



What is often overlooked is the fact that these genocidal massacres targeted, not only the Armenians, but also the Greeks and the Assyrians who had the misfortune of being Christian citizens of Turkey. Dr. Joseph Yacoub, an Assyrian historian, who was professor of "International Relations," at the Catholic University in Lyon, France, writes that besides the Armenians, Greeks and Assyrians were also massacred. Professor Yacoub says that the Turkish policy of ethnic cleansing by mass killings and cruel deportations was stirred up and fueled by Islamic fanaticism whose victims were the Christian minorities in Turkey.

Despite the overwhelming evidence provided by eyewitnesses, foreign diplomats, journalists, American and European missionaries, and archival documents, the successive Turkish governments since 1915 have consistently denied the historical reality of the Armenian Genocide. The Greek dramatist, Aeschylus, who lived in 550 B.C., rightly says, "In war, truth is the first casualty."

More recently, in September of 2020, Azerbaijan attacked Armenia in Artsakh and was immediately joined by Turkey, whose President Erdogan admitted that the Turkish Special forces were directly involved in leading the battles against the Armenians. Once again, the barbarian Turks committed heinous crimes that were reminiscent of the Genocide of 1915. When they captured an Armenian female soldier, a mother of 3 children, they gang-raped her, chopped off her limbs, gouged her eyes and placed her severed finger inside her private parts.

The Genocide of the Armenians is still continuing. Aliyev, the dictator of Baku, continues to threaten Armenia with extinction, and the civilized world remains silent. "Woe to those who call evil good, and good evil" (Isaiah 5:20).

Just as Abel's blood cries out for justice in Genesis 4:10, the souls of the martyred Christian Armenians raise the same demand today. The Lord will not overlook the guilt of those who promote injustice or encourage oppression.

A reminder to those who shout, "Never Again!" Well, genocidal massacres are taking place today, and God requires that people of integrity lend their support to the cause of truth and justice, and refrain from equating the victims with the perpetrators of violence.

Edmund Burke, the Irish philosopher says, "The only thing necessary for the triumph of evil is for good people to do nothing." Do not contribute to the victory of evil by remaining passive and inactive. Let us not stop protesting against injustice.

If the Turks of Northern Cyprus and the Moslems of Kosovo have the right to self-rule and autonomy, then the Armenians of Artsakh should be granted the same privilege.

CHRIST'S TEMPTATION


